Imagine there is a peaceful, home-like place that offers comfort and support to you and your family at the end of life.

A place where personalised, expert care is provided, and all are welcomed by a friendly face. Here, we celebrate a life well-lived and well-loved, a life not defined by illness.

Fitzroy Community Hospice is a not-for-profit charitable organisation establishing a hospice in Rockhampton to provide much needed community-based palliative care and support services for Central Queenslanders with an incurable illness.

Care will be provided at no charge to our community.



Fitzroy Community Hospice is committed to ensuring people are connected to a community that will step up to care for them; in life, death and bereavement.

This project is bringing the community together to build a hospice, and to make this vital service a reality for everyone.

What is a hospice?

A hospice is a special kind of community-based health service that cares for and supports people in their last weeks and months of a terminal illness, so that they may live as fully and comfortably as possible. Care is personalised and attends to a person's physical, emotional, cultural, and spiritual needs, with a particular focus on dignity, quality of life and the relief of pain and suffering. Family, friends, and loved ones are also supported and are encouraged to be actively involved in the care of the person.

Fitzroy Community Hospice will provide hospice care in a purpose built, home-like facility, allowing Central Queenslanders additional choice in determining where they want to spend their final stages of life.

Everyone in Central Queensland, and their loved ones, deserve dedicated end-of-life care and to have their journey treated with empathy and respect.

Central Queensland urgently needs a hospice

Each year, thousands of Central Queensland families are loving and caring for someone with an incurable, life-limiting illness.

Despite most Australians preferring to not die in hospital, well over half of Central Queenslanders with terminal illnesses spend their final days in a hospital bed, and face ambulance ramping and long waits.

Access to comprehensive community-based palliative care is currently limited in Central Queensland. Patients wishing to die at home or in community settings, receive little support to do so and are often admitted numerous times to hospital in their last year of life.



Of the nine hospices in Queensland, most are in South East Queensland, with none north of Hervey Bay. Sadly, this means many families in our community are not able to access this type of care during one of life's most challenging times.

Our local population is growing, and as people age and health requirements become more complex, the need for a hospice is only going to become greater.

Each year, over 1,000 Central Queensland locals die from a condition that could benefit from hospice care. By 2036 this number is expected to reach 2,100.

Fitzroy Community Hospice will provide:

- An alternative to hospital or home-based palliative care, at no charge.
- A place where families are welcomed and encouraged to stay.
- A purpose built state of the art, 12 bed facility with a warm, home-like atmosphere for patients and families.
- Palliative care nurses and specialised staff providing 24/7 care.
- Family and caregiver support and respite services.
- Comprehensive care addressing physical, cultural, emotional and spiritual care needs.
- Grief and bereavement support for families and caregivers.



Establishing a hospice will take the support of the *entire community*

A hospice is expensive to build.

The cost to build a hospice facility for Central Queensland is \$10.5 million. The Australian Government have recognised the vital importance of this project to our community and have committed \$8 million in funding towards construction. However, this will only **cover a portion of the capital costs** and a further \$1 million will be raised to meet the costs of fit-out, equipment, furniture, and landscaping.

The hospice facility will operate as a licenced health facility and will be accredited to national health standards. Thus, exacting quality and safety standards will apply to the built environment. Extensive consultation has been undertaken to ensure the facility will meet the needs of the community both now and into the future.

All money raised will stay within the local community and be used to benefit the local community.



Fitzroy Community Hospice will be established in Agnes Street, Rockhampton as a purpose built state-of-the-art 12 bed facility with a warm, home-like atmosphere for patients and families to make moments count when time is short.

Local families simply *can't* afford to wait

Hospice care is about much more than bricks and mortar, it's about caring for our community for generations to come.

At some point, every person in the Central Queensland community will be touched by the need for hospice care and support - for themselves, their families, friends, or colleagues.

The final stages of a terminal illness can be a highly challenging time. Fitzroy Community Hospice will provide warm, personalised, 24/7 care at no charge, regardless of age, ethnicity or spiritual beliefs.

Colin's story

Colin, 78 years old was diagnosed with end stage lung disease. In his last 12 months of life, he was on continuous home oxygen and was able to mobilise only from room to room.

Breathlessness caused Colin great distress and he was fearful of what his last-days-of-life might bring, he was therefore adamant that he did not want to die at home.

This fear prompted countless ambulance call outs and over 8 acute hospital admissions in a 6-month period. Some admissions were also prompted by his son's exhaustion as sole caregiver.

Colin's need for palliative care was recognised by his GP but at the time he was ineligible for care by specialist palliative care services, and community-based nursing providers lacked the specialist skill needed to meet his needs.


Colin died in a 4-bed room on a busy general medical ward.

Jane's story

Jane, 38 years was diagnosed with metastatic brain cancer. Her husband became the sole carer of their two young children and needed to work full time to support their family.

The burden was too great for Jane to be cared for at home, and the only option was for her to spend the last three months of her life in hospital.

Jane had a passion for gardening and adored her dog, Jasper. She and her family were devastated that her last months of life were spent away from her husband, kids, and Jasper, and instead spent mostly alone within the confines of a hospital room.
